# COMMON SNAKES OF KRUGERSDORP



Krugersdorp has around 21 different species of snakes. Two species are considered highly venomous. Another two may give a bad bite and one may require stitches. Six are considered mildly venomous and the rest are completely harmless to humans.

Not thought to be harmful to humans **HARMLESS** 



# EMERGENCY PROTOCOL

#### IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

3 Call the Poison Information Centre helpline for further advice: 0861 555 777.

### DO NOT —

... apply a tourniquet.

- ... cut and suck the wound.
- ... use ice or very hot water.
- ... give the victim alcohol.
- ... apply electric shock.
- ... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
