DANGEROUS SNAKES OF THE EASTERN CAPE




The Eastern Cape has fifty-one different types of snakes. Twenty-four species are not venomous, while eleven are mildly venomous. Nine snake species are venomous and seven species are considered highly venomous.

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EMERGENCY PROTOCOL

IN THE EVENT OF A SNAKE BITE

1 Keep the victim calm, immobilized and transport the victim to the closest hospital without delay.

2 If the victim stops breathing, resort to artificial respiration or make use of a Bag Valve Mask.

DO NOT —

... apply a tourniquet.

... cut and suck the wound.

... use ice or very hot water.

... give the victim alcohol.

... apply electric shock.

... inject antivenom randomly. Antivenom (if required) must be administered by a doctor in a hospital environment.
